§ Tuesday is the spring equinox, so if you can spot the sunrise or sunset point on the horizon, return to that location and you'll be amazed at how fast the sun moves north in coming weeks. As a result, in the month after equinox, we gain 47 minutes of morning light and 38 minutes of evening light for a total of 1 hour and 25 min. of additional light by Apr. 20. If you are not aware of invasive woody plants on your land, this is a good time to find them: callery pears are covered with white blooms and if its a shrub that already has its leaves out, it's probably bush honeysuckle. Both should be removed due to their habit of taking over and killing out most other species. I've seen pussytoes blooming on area prairies already, and with wood betony, puccoon and verbena emerged, these will be blooming on prairies, while in the oak-hickory woodlands, look for woodland violets, rue anemone & dutchman's breeches. S Of course, this time of year is not just being celebrated by emerging early spring plants: migratory bats should be showing up in coming weeks, there are plenty of pregnant mammals, it's

mating season for moles, pocket gophers skunks and woodchucks, and squirrels and foxes are bearing young.
